Airships to the Arctic Conference

Limited transportation options in the North increase the direct costs of shipping and add to the indirect cost of inventories. Concerns about climate change impacts, delays in environmental approvals, and uncertainty regarding First Nations land claims further increase investment risk. As a result, the transportation solution offered by airships is gathering increased interest in northern Canada.

Airships have endurance, over-sized cargo capacity, ability to operate with minimal ground support, and require low maintenance. Cargo airships will have a revolutionary impact on northern transportation and logistics.

Airships to the Arctic: The Tipping Point will be held October 7-9 in Calgary, Alberta. The conference will examine the demand for transportation in northern Canada and provide an update on the supply of airship technology and potential deployment opportunities to respond to northern challenges.
